Foreword

The 20th Asian Games Aichi-Nagoya 2026 will be held in Aichi-Nagoya, Japan, from 19 September to 4 October 2026. It is a very meaningful event for all of Japan, as it brings a chance to further deepen growing exchange within Asia.

“IMAGINE ONE ASIA” is our slogan for the Games. The organizers claim that sports have the power to bring people together beyond the barriers of language, culture and nationality. They hope that Aichi-Nagoya 2026 Asian Games will be the opportunity for every people in Asia to be able to imagine their own ‘ONE ASIA’ with the power of sports so that the ties among the people in Asia will be strengthen and they can forward to the bright future.

1.1. Emblem

The smooth curves describe the liveliness of sports.

The center line colored by purple, gold and green inspires the image that people get together as one and go forward to the future by heading to a bright red sun, the symbol of the Olympic Council of Asia (OCA). The purple is used as an image of the iris which is the prefectural flower of Aichi. The gold describes the Kinshachi, the golden tiger-fish roof ornaments and the symbol of the Nagoya Castle. And the green inspires the high environmental consciousness among people of Aichi-Nagoya fostered through the EXPO Aichi 2005, the COP10 and the UNESCO World Conference on ESD. The emblem contains the initial letters of Asia, Aichi and Nagoya. You could see "A" described by the purple curve and the center line and "N" designed by the purple and the gold.



1.2. Mascot

"HONOHON," the mascot of the 20th Asian Games, was born from the fiery passion that dwells in the hearts of athletes, becoming one with Shachihoko, the guardian deity of Aichi-Nagoya.

The name "HONOHON" is derived from the word "Honoho," which is said to be the origin of the Japanese word meaning "flame," that comes from the image of fire rising high and burning brightly, resembling the shape of a rice ear ("ho" in Japanese). To make the name sound more friendly, we named it "HONOHON."

2. Accreditation and Validation

AINAGOC will distribute the Accreditation Guide to Responsible Organisations in December 2025. The Accreditation system will be available from 11 December 2025 to 14 May 2026.

All athletes, including those who may participate through Late Athlete Replacement (LAR), must complete their Accreditation Application within this period.

All athletes who may potentially participate in the Games must be registered in the Accreditation long list.

From July 2026 onwards, AINAGOC will produce and deliver the Pre-valid Asian Games Identity and Accreditation Card (PVC) to Responsible Organisations that have confirmed their Accreditation Status Report.

Upon arrival in Japan, Games stakeholders will be required to validate their PVC at the Welcome Centre 1 accreditation validation desk or other accreditation facilities by presenting their valid identity documents. For further details, please refer to Chapter 7.1 of the Accreditation Guide.

After validation at the accreditation facility, the PVC becomes the AGIAC, which grants access to competition and non-competition venues and zones. The AGIAC grants the cardholder the appropriate access entitlements to the venues and zones.

Please note that athletes designated for Late Athlete Replacement (LAR) cannot validate their PVC unless and until the replacement is officially approved.

3. Validity Period of AGIAC

When a participant presents the PVC or the AGIAC in conjunction with the valid passport (or equivalent travel document), it will function as a visa waiver when applying for entering Japan and can be used multiple times between 0:00 on 31 July 2026 and 23:59 on 19 October 2026.

4. Transport

Athletes and team officials will be provided with transport on arrival and departure, for competitions, and for training. Services will be available for the designated locations. AINAGOC will allocate a specific number of dedicated vehicles to each NOC delegation for its exclusive use. For more details, please refer to the *Transport Guide for Athlete & NOCS* published on September 30.

5. Accommodation

A conventional Athletes' Village will not be built.

During the 20th Asian Games Aichi-Nagoya 2026, NOC athletes and team officials will be accommodated at Garden Pier (Villas*), Kinjo Pier (cruise ship), and existing accommodation facilities (hotels, etc.), and Technical Delegates (TDs), International

Technical Officials (ITOs) and National Technical Officials (NTOs) will be accommodated at existing accommodation facilities (hotels, etc.).

Necessary functions and services will be provided. In principle, it has to be ensured that TOs will be accommodated at separate lodging facilities from NOC athletes.

For security reasons, access to the Athletes' Accommodations will require the appropriate accreditation card.

*A facility that houses accommodation amenities within a container-sized unit, allowing for easy transportation via trailer or ship, and used as a hotel or private residence.

6. Media Services

6.1. Broadcast Mixed Zone

All athletes are required to pass through the Broadcast Mixed Zone after the competition. However, athletes are not obligated to comply with interview requests in this area.

The Broadcast Mixed Zone is directly connected to the Press Mixed Zone, ensuring a seamless transition for athletes and media representatives.

* Victory Ceremony Procedure:

If an athlete is scheduled to attend the victory ceremony, the Ceremony Producer or Sports Manager will notify the Host Broadcasters and Press Mixed Zone Manager. These athletes will then be escorted to the ceremony briefing area. After the victory ceremony, they will return to the Broadcast Mixed Zone and pass through the area.

6.2. Press Mixed Zone

Athletes must pass through the Press Mixed Zone right after passing through the Broadcast Mixed Zone so that they can be interviewed by accredited press as soon as possible after the competition ends. They also have the right to decline interviews and go directly through the Mixed Zone.

6.3. Press Conference Room

After the finals of each event, in principle, a post-competition press conference will be arranged. At these Press conferences, interpretation in 6 languages (Japanese, English, Chinese, Korean, Russian and Arabic) will be provided. Translating a participant's native language into English, if needed, shall be done by the Press Attaché(s) or staff of the relevant NOC taking part.

If the athlete notified of a doping test has not yet completed it, Doping Control Personnel shall be permitted to attend the press conference for continuous observation.

6.4. FOP Photo Positions

FOP photo positions will be set up in FOPs or FOP surrounding areas in each competition venue. These positions are for accredited photographers to use to take photos of competitions. Accredited photographers will need to wear supplementary access control devices in order to enter FOP photo positions. During the victory ceremony, a suitable temporary position will be set up if deemed necessary.

For some events, the shooting at the FOP photo positions may use photo truck(s), photo boat(s), catwalk remote control camera(s), shooting house(s), and underwater remote-control camera(s). Some of these special photo positions will be provided through the Rate Cards.

6.5. NOC Press Attaché

NOC press attachés with Supplementary access control device(s) will assist in facilitating interviews between Athletes and Accredited press. They can enter the athletes' side of the Press Mixed Zone, determined by PRS. Where necessary, language support volunteers may assist them in their activities.

7. Medical Services

During the Games, AINAGOC will run Medical rooms for athletes at both competition venue and training venue and provide onsite medical services and emergency transport. At each athletes' accommodation, medical staff will be stationed to provide necessary

care and treatment.

If advanced care and further exams are needed, patients will be transferred to the Games' designated hospitals.

If necessary, medical services such as emergency treatment, hospitalization and emergency transfer will be provided.

Onsite Basic medical services and emergency transport services will be provided free of charge.

Other medical services shall be paid for in accordance with the provisions stated in the relevant policy for insurance cover.

Free medical services will not include non-essential medical care nor elective medical treatment.

8. Doping Control

In order to ensure healthy and fair competitions and protect the interests of the athletes, the Anti-doping programme of the 20th Asian Games Aichi-Nagoya 2026 will be conducted in strict accordance with the World Anti-doping Code and the OCA Anti-doping Rules.

All athletes heading to the Games will need to complete the ADEL, which is provided by WADA, for International Level Athlete (ILA) e-learning module and all coaches will need to complete the ADEL for Coaches of High Performance (CHP) e-learning module successfully. We strongly encourage you to start on this early. Further details are currently under consideration within the OCA, so please wait until the publication of the Doping Control Guide in April 2026.

9. Weather Information

9.1. Climate in Aichi-Nagoya

In Aichi-Nagoya, the average maximum temperature in September is 29.9°C, so the summer heat still lingers. In October, the temperature drops to 23.9°C, and signs of autumn begin to appear.

The average minimum temperature also gradually cools, reaching 22.1°C in September and 15.4°C in October.

The average rainfall is relatively high, at 197.5mm in September and 177.9mm in October.

9.2. Climate in Gifu

In Gifu, the average maximum temperature in September is 30.0°C, which is one of the highest in the country. By October, the temperature drops to 24.0°C, signaling the arrival

of autumn.

The average minimum temperature is also cooler, at 21.9°C in September and 15.0°C in October.

Rainfall is heavier in September, averaging 237.8mm, and in October, averaging 179.3mm.

9.3. Climate in Shizuoka

Shizuoka remains hot in September with an average maximum temperature of 29.3°C and an average minimum of 22.1°C, but by October the weather becomes more comfortable with an average maximum of 24.2°C and an average minimum of 16.3°C. The average daily temperature is a comfortable 20.0°C even in October.

The average rainfall is high, at 314.8 mm in September and 242.0 mm in October, and the area is heavily affected by typhoon season.

9.4. Climate in Tokyo

Tokyo continues to be hot and humid in September with an average maximum temperature of 28.2°C and an average minimum temperature of 21.2°C, but in October it becomes more comfortable with an average maximum temperature of 22.6°C and an average minimum temperature of 15.2°C.

The average rainfall is high in September at 255.3 mm and in October at 212.0 mm.

9.5. Climate in Osaka

Osaka continues to be hot in September with an average maximum temperature of 29.9°C and an average minimum of 22.6°C, but in October the weather becomes more autumnal with an average maximum of 24.1°C and an average minimum of 16.3°C.

The average rainfall is relatively low, at 153.6mm in September and 131.1mm in October.

II. Technical Information

1. Competition Date

The Artistic Gymnastics competition of the 20th Asian Games Aichi-Nagoya 2026 will be held from 21 to 25 September 2026.

2. Competition Venue

The Artistic Gymnastics competition will be held at Nagoya City General Gymnasium [Rainbow Hall] with a seating capacity of 5,000. The annex hall of the Gymnasium will be used for warm-up. The venue is 13 kilometres away from the Athletes' Accommodation.

4. Competition Events

The Artistic Gymnastics competition of the 20th Asian Games Aichi-Nagoya 2026 consists of 14 events, including eight (8) men's events and six (6) women's events as follows:

Men's (8): Team, All-Around, Floor Exercise, Pommel Horse, Rings, Vault, Parallel Bars, Horizontal Bar.

Women's (6): Team, All-Around, Vault, Uneven Bars, Balance Beam, Floor Exercises.

6. Competition Rules

The Artistic Gymnastics competition of the 20th Asian Games Aichi-Nagoya 2026 will be held in accordance with the latest version of the technical and competition rules and

Code of Points of the World Gymnastics (WGYM) in force during Games-time.

Detailed information is available on the website of the

World Gymnastics (WGYM): www.gymnastics.sport

In case of any disagreement in the interpretation of the FIG rules, regulations and Code of Points, the English version shall prevail.

Any unforeseen circumstances not covered by the regulations, rules, and Code of Points shall be resolved as follows:

- Technical issues: Resolved in accordance with FIG rules, regulations and Code of Points.
- General issues: Resolved in accordance with the Olympic Council of Asia (OCA) Constitution and Rules.

7. Competition Format

The Artistic Gymnastics competition consists of Qualifications & All-Around Finals, Team Finals, and Apparatus Finals.

7.1. All-Around Finals, Team, and Apparatus Qualifications

- Men's competition consists of exercises on six (6) apparatuses while women's includes exercises on four (4) apparatuses. Only gymnasts who compete on all the apparatus are eligible for the All-Round Final.
- All-Around ranking will be defined in the Qualifications.
- Gymnasts and teams may advance to the Team Final and the Apparatus Finals through the Qualifications.
- There are three (3) to five (5) gymnasts of a team who participate in team competitions (no reserves). Every team may assign a maximum of four (4) gymnasts to compete on each apparatus and the scores of the best three (3) on each apparatus will be taken into account for the team total.
- Two (2) vaults are required to qualify for the Vault Final, and the qualifying score is based on the average of the two (2) scores.
- The first vault will be counted in the All-Around and Team rankings.
- The confirmation of the starting order must be submitted online via Form 5Q 24 hours at the latest before the start of the first MAG or WAG Subdivision each day.
 - For MAG Subdivision 1 and 2: 20 September 2026 at 10:00
 - For WAG Subdivision 1 to 3: 21 September 2026 at 12:00

- If NOCs do not follow these deadlines, then the starting order will be determined based on the gymnasts' bib numbers.
- The gymnasts will be authorized to return to the warm-up hall during the Qualifications. However, before using the designated stretching area and the apparatus, gymnasts must first obtain permission from the NOCs warming up for the next subdivision, who will always have priority.
- Gymnasts will be fully responsible for being present in the FOP when required in order to perform their routine on time.
- At the end of the Qualifications, the lists of qualified teams and gymnasts (including the designated reserves and the NOC substitutes) for the Team Finals and the Apparatus Finals will be published and distributed. In case of ties, the tie-breaking rules as defined in the FIG Technical Regulation (TR) will apply.
- A gymnast qualified for the Apparatus Finals may be substituted by another gymnast from the same NOC, as per FIG TR Section 2, if the substitute is ranked above the first designated reserve.

7.2. Team Final

- Top 8 teams in the Qualifications will advance to the final.
- The start apparatus will be defined by the Qualifications results.
- Scores of the Qualifications will not carry over to the final.
- One (1) reserve team in each event will be designated based on scores of the Qualifications.
- Each team includes three (3) to five (5) gymnasts.
- Every team may assign minimum three (3) gymnasts to compete on each apparatus and the scores of all three (3) on each apparatus will be taken into account for team total.
- Men's competition consists of exercises on six (6) apparatus while women's includes exercises on four (4) apparatus.
- During the Team Final, gymnasts are authorized to leave the FOP to return to the Warm-up Hall.
- Participation in the Team Final does not need to be confirmed. However, any place refused must be submitted online by the Head of Delegation/Representative via Form 5Q at the very latest 24 hours before the start of each Final as follows:
 - For MAG: 22 September 2026 at 13:00

- For WAG: 22 September 2026 at 19:00
- A link with a personal login and password will be sent by the WGYM IT Dept. to each NOC to enable access to the system.
- In case of ties, the tie-breaking rules as defined in the FIG TR will apply.

7.3. Apparatus Finals

- Top eight (8) gymnasts (up to two (2) athletes in each NOC) in the Qualifications will advance to the final.
- Scores of the Qualifications will not be carried over to the final. Three (3) reserve gymnasts in each event will be designated based on scores of the Qualifications.
- The starting order will take place as per the gymnasts' drawing of lots results. The gymnasts will compete in two groups as follows:
 - Gymnasts 1- 4 compete first after completing their "touch warm-up"
 - Gymnasts 5- 8 compete second after completing their "touch warm-up"
- In case more than 8 finalists qualify for the Apparatus Finals, a draw is conducted between the tied gymnasts. The group with the smallest number of gymnasts will "touch warm-up" and compete first.

- at the very latest 1 hour before the start of the VT Final via online Form 6AF

10. Ranking and Medals

10.1. All-Around Final

The ranking will be determined based on scores of the Qualification & All-Around Final. Gymnasts with higher scores rank higher. In case of same scores, the ranking will be defined in accordance with the tie-breaking terms stipulated in the FIG TR.

10.2. Team Final

The ranking will be determined based on scores of the Team Final. Teams with higher scores rank higher. In case of same scores, the ranking will be defined in accordance with the tie-breaking terms stipulated in the FIG TR.

10.3. Apparatus Finals

The ranking will be determined based on scores of the Apparatus Finals. Gymnasts with higher scores rank higher. In case of same scores, the ranking will be defined in accordance with the tie-breaking terms stipulated in the FIG TR.

11. Sport Entries

11.1. Eligibility

- Only NOCs that are members of the OCA are entitled to send athletes to compete in the Artistic Gymnastics competition of the 20th Asian Games Aichi-Nagoya 2026.
- Only athletes who comply with the OCA Constitution and Rules and its Byelaw are entitled to compete in the Artistic Gymnastics competition.

- All gymnasts must present a valid FIG License until the end of the Artistic Gymnastics competition of the 20th Asian Games Aichi-Nagoya 2026.
- To be eligible to participate in the Asian Games Aichi-Nagoya 2026, Male GAR athletes must be Senior age, born on or before 31 December 2008, and Female GAR athletes must be Senior age, born on or before 31 December 2010.

NOCs must declare whether their 18-year-old Men's athletes will compete as junior or senior prior to their first competition in 2026.

NOCs that withdraw their athletes after the final entries' submission (SEQ deadline) or the team draw phase will face a disciplinary action by the OCA Executive Board.

11.2. Entry Timeline

- Entry by Sport: 12 Jun 2025 – 07 Jul 2025
- Preliminary Entry by Number: 18 July 2025 - 16 September 2025
- Entry by Number – Second Round: 08 December 2025 - 31 January 2026
- Entry by Name (SEQ Period): 01 May 2026 - 01 July 2026

12. Competition and Training

12.1. Training Venue

The Training Venue will be open from 17 September to 25 September 2026. The scheduled training will then take place from 17 September to 25 September 2026 on an allocation basis.

For gymnasts who do not progress beyond the Qualifications as well as for NOC substitutes (i.e., ranked higher than designated reserves but excluded from the Finals due to NOC limits), open and free training sessions will be made available following the Qualifications. Due to space limits, the judges will not be authorized to attend any training sessions.

The first training day as 17th September will be open to media in the limited areas.

12.2. Podium Training

The podium training will be held on 18th September for Men and 20th September for Women. Podium Trainings will be considered as Training Days and will be open to media.

The single Podium Training session will be held in accordance with the starting order for the Qualifications and will in principle follow the time periods for Qualifications. During their allocated Podium Training session time, the gymnasts will be authorized to return to the warm-up hall. However, before using the designated stretching area and the apparatus, gymnasts must first obtain permission from the NOCs warming up for the next subdivision, who will always have priority.

To ensure that the Women gymnasts' FX music will be played in the desired order, NOCs will be required to submit the online Form 4 at 24 hours at the latest prior to Subdivision 1. A link with a personal login and password will be sent by the WGYM IT Dept. to each NOC to enable access to the system.

After each podium training session, the official and compulsory portrait photo session will take place in the I-Zone, which is located next to the Warm-up Hall (see Appendix 1).

After the podium training session, the official and compulsory portrait photo and sports presentation photo sessions will take place in the designated space which will be located next to the Warm-up Hall. For the portrait photo session, athletes are requested to wear their national tracksuit, and any visible branding must meet the FIG Advertising Rules.

Provisions for Men

- At the start of the competition, coaches/gymnasts may begin preparing the

- apparatus as soon as the gymnasts' presentation or the march -in music starts.
- Preparation of any apparatus may be performed by coaches for the upcoming rotation upon completion of the final exercise in the current rotation and publication of the last gymnast's score on that apparatus.

Qualifications & All-Around Final and Team Final:

- For preparation of any apparatus prior to an exercise (during the "touch" warm-up and competition), any FOP accredited person from the NOC of the gymnasts may assist.

Apparatus Finals:

- A maximum of three people (the competing gymnast, coach, and 1 other FOP accredited person) may be on the podium to prepare the apparatus. These three people must have their respective SACD (FOP Access Card) in order to enter the FOP (*The SACDs for the apparatus finals will be distributed from the next day of the qualification). This additional gymnast or coach must exit the FOP immediately.

Provisions for Women

- At the start of the competition, coaches/gymnasts may begin preparing the apparatus as soon as the gymnasts' presentation or the march-in music starts.
- For all of subsequent rotations, coaches/gymnasts may move to the apparatus in advance and begin preparations as soon as the rotation music starts.

VT and BB (Qualifications and all the Finals):

- The accredited coaches in attendance on the FOP may prepare VT and BB.

UB (Qualifications and all the Finals):

- Since 2 accredited persons may prepare the UB, if a NOC has only 1 accredited coach in attendance on the FOP, an additional gymnast, coach or medical staff may enter the FOP to assist with the preparation. Once the UB is ready, this additional gymnast, coach or medical staff must exit the FOP immediately or at the very latest by the end of the gymnast's routine.
- All the Apparatus Finals:
- All the people who enter the FOP during the Apparatus Finals, they must have their respective SACD (FOP Access Card for Apparatus Finals) in order to enter the FOP (*The SACDs for the Apparatus Finals will be distributed from the next day of the Qualification).

12.4. “Touch” Warm-up on the FOP

For the Qualifications and all the Finals, the “touch” warm-up period will be provided on the FOP for each gymnast as follows:

- For MAG:
 - 50 seconds on FX, PH, SR, PB, and HB
 - A maximum of 2 attempts on VT
- For WAG:
 - 30 seconds on FX and BB.
 - 50 seconds on UB (including the preparation of the bars)
 - A maximum of 2 attempts on VT, except in Qualifications, where gymnasts aiming for the Apparatus Final may have up to 3 attempts

For the Qualifications and the Team Final, all gymnasts will perform their “touch” warm-up as one group, according to the starting order.

For the Apparatus Finals, the “touch” warm-up will be conducted on each apparatus in two groups based on the starting order:

- Gymnasts 1- 4 will “touch” warm-up first and then compete.
- Once gymnasts 1- 4 have finished competing, gymnasts 5-8 will “touch” warm-up and then compete.

If more than 8 finalists qualify for an apparatus, a draw will be conducted between the tied gymnasts. In such cases, the first group to “touch” warm-up (and compete) will have the smallest number of gymnasts, the second group will include the others.

Kiss and Cry (K &C)

During Apparatus Finals only, the K & C area will be reserved exclusively for gymnasts and coaches. They must remain on the presentation stage, until a few seconds after their score is displayed. This procedure will be confirmed at the Technical Meeting.

13. Technical Officials and Jury of Appeal

AGU has the right to appoint the Technical Delegates (TDs) and International Technical Officials (ITOs) in coordination and approval of the OCA. Members of the Jury of Appeal should be appointed by AGU. National Technical Officials (NTOs) should be appointed by the Japan Gymnastics Association (JGA). In the event of any violation of the AGU/FIG Rules or Games Rules and Regulations by any participant, the OCA has the right to revoke his or her accreditation card and propose replacement of the participant concerned to the relevant party.

Every judges / ITOs must have a valid WGYM brevet in the corresponding discipline.

14. D-judges

The 12 MAG and 8 WAG Difficulty Judges for the Games have been drawn respectively by the Men's Technical Committee and Women's Technical Committee of AGU respectively.

15. E-judges

NOCs entering 1-3 MAG and 1-3 WAG gymnasts have the right to present one qualified E-judge, regardless of whether a D-judge was drawn. Each participating NOC entering 4-6 MAG and 4-6 WAG gymnasts may register two qualified E-judges in good standing. At least one will be called upon to judge, provided that no D-judge from that NF was drawn. If a D-judge was drawn, only one E-judge can be assigned. The total number of judges per NF may not exceed 2.

E-judges cannot attend Podium Trainings on the FOP. It is however their responsibility to be present for the start of their Judges' Instructions as follows:

- For MAG: 17 September 2026 at 15:00 in the Press Conference Room
- For WAG: 18 September 2026 at 15:00 in the Press Conference Room

The E-judges' draw will be conducted in accordance with the principles mentioned in the TR Section 2, and as outlined in the General and Discipline Specific Judges' Rules.

16. Technical Meeting

The Technical Meeting will start at 19:00 on September 17 in the Multi-Purpose Room (Same as the Press Mixed Zone) at Nagoya City General Gymnasium [Rainbow Hall].

NOCs have to attend this meeting with a max of 2 accredited members, including the Head of Delegation/Representative.

17. Inquiries and Request

17.1. Inquiries

Inquiries shall be handled by following the latest version of FIG TR, such as contents, time limit, objects and procedures of inquiry.

In competitions organised or sanctioned by WGYM, inquiries for scores may be submitted to the President of the Superior Jury (or, if applicable, the Technical Delegate). Only the Difficulty Score (D-score) may be subject to an Inquiry. Inquiries cannot be withdrawn once submitted.

The AINAGOC designated person to receive the inquiry at the Inquiry Desk in the FOP must initialize the process by operating the dedicated device.

Electronic Device: Inquiries must be submitted within two minutes after the score is displayed. The device will automatically prevent late submissions. In case of a device malfunction, the Inquiry Desk staff shall use best efforts to manually establish and record the timely submission, if possible, using an official inquiry form.

Official Inquiry Form: Where no device is available, inquiries must be submitted using the official inquiry form to the Inquiry desk:

- before the score for the next gymnast, group or unit is displayed or,
- for the last gymnast, group or unit in a rotation, within two minutes after the score is displayed. The Inquiry staff will verify if the inquiry was submitted within the deadline and record this on the official inquiry form.

Late or incorrectly submitted inquiries will be rejected by the President of the Superior Jury (or, if applicable, the Technical Delegate). The rejection must be recorded in the Electronic Device or on the Official Inquiry Form.

The decision not to accept an inquiry—whether due to it being filed late or not following the correct procedure—is final and cannot be challenged.

The Inquiry Officer will, if needed, either unlock the electronic system for the NF Authorised Representatives to submit the inquiry in the device or record the submission time on the official inquiry form.

Timely and properly submitted inquiries will be reviewed by the President of the Superior Jury (or, if applicable, the Technical Delegate) using official competition footage only.

The decision will be made as quickly as possible. The inquiry must be resolved before the next gymnast, group, or unit's score is displayed.

The score may be increased, reduced, or remain unchanged after the inquiry review.

Decisions on inquiries are final field-of-play decisions and cannot be challenged internally or externally, including appeals to the Court of Arbitration for Sport (CAS), which has no jurisdiction over any challenge. This rule overrides any prior or future provisions granting CAS broader jurisdiction.

The cost per inquiry is USD 300 for the first, USD 500 for the second, and USD 1,000 for each subsequent inquiry throughout the entire duration of the competition (and not starting from “1” again at each competition phase).

If the Difficulty score is increased, the fee is waived; if it remains unchanged or is reduced, the fee is charged to the NF and transferred to the AGU Foundation for Solidarity.

Inquiry costs will be invoiced to the NFs by the AGU after the competition. No payment will be accepted on site.

17.2. Request to Revise Time and Line Deductions

Requests to revise Time or Line deductions, as allowed by the Code of Points, are treated separately from inquiries and do not incur any cost. However, such requests must comply with the same principles, procedures, and deadlines specified in this article for inquiries. Requests to revise other neutral deductions or penalties are not permitted.

18. Equipment and Attire

18.1. Equipment

The FIG Certified Manufacturer Supplier for these the Asian Games will be Taishan. The colour of the FX mat will be purple. The Apparatus controls will be conducted as per the enclosed schedule.

Refer to Appendix 2 of the Directives for details on the list of certified Apparatus used.

18.2. Attire

Equipment used and clothing worn by athletes and other relevant participants in competition must comply with the rules and regulations of the OCA and FIG. Neither athletes nor technical officials can attach any form of commercial advertising to his or her competition uniform without prior approval of the OCA and AINAGOC.

19. Victory Ceremony

Gold, silver, and bronze medals will be awarded to the athletes ranked in the top three of each individual event according to the official results. In team event, gold, silver, and bronze medals will be awarded to the athletes of the teams ranked in the top three of each event according to the official results. In the case that multiple athletes are tied, a replica medal may be awarded at the ceremony and will be replaced with the official medal at a later date.

The Victory Ceremony will start approximately 15 minutes after the final event. To prepare for the ceremony, the medalists shall be escorted to the Waiting Area 10 minutes before the ceremony starts. Detailed movement at ceremony will be instructed at Waiting Area.

20. Sport Information Desk (SID)

The SID will be located in the front of the Athletes' Lounge (see Appendix 1) from 17th to 25th September, 2026 and will be in operation during all Training, Podium Training,

Warm-up, and Competition times. While an information wall will be set up at the SID, Delegations will be invited to join a WhatsApp group, should they wish to do so.

All details for the competition, warm-up, podium training, training, notification of meetings, transport, official functions, AGU and AINAGOC correspondences, start lists, results and a range of other information related to these Asian Games will be distributed on NOC Extranet (<https://www.noc-net.aichi-nagoya2026.info/>). The AINAGOC will not provide printed copies of the Technical handbook, Appendices, or Forms. Paper forms will only be available at the SID if necessary and upon request.

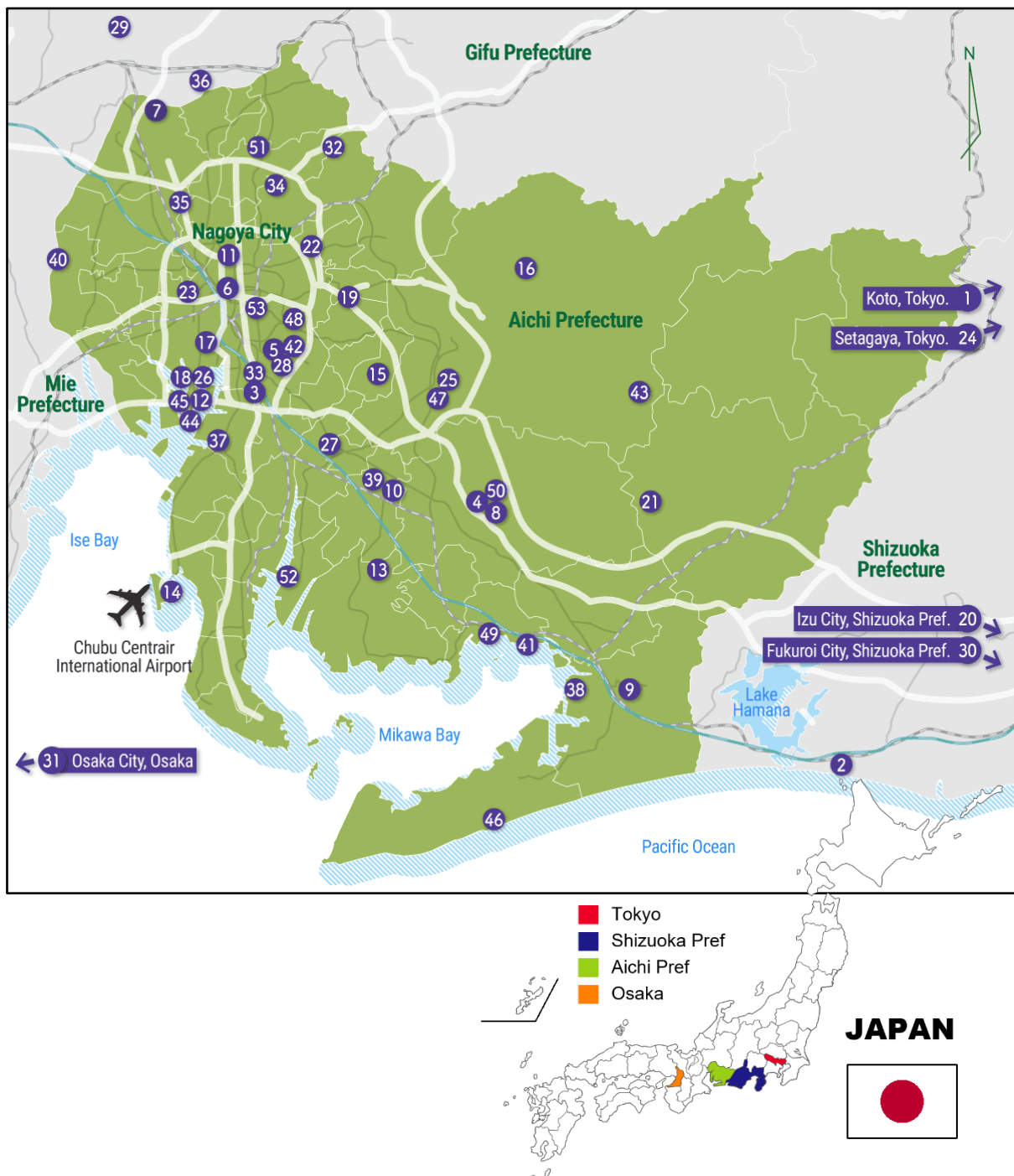

8. OCA Constitution

Article 52

- Eligibility Code
 - To be eligible for participation in the OCA GAMES, a competitor must:
 1. Observe and abide by the Rules of the IOC/OCA as per the Olympic Charter.
 2. Respect the spirit of fair play and non-violence and abide by the rules on the sports field.
 3. Comply with all aspects of WADA and OCA Anti-Doping Rules Code and refrain from using substances and drugs prohibited by the said organisations.
 4. The Member must ensure that any competitor in the OCA GAMES must be a national of the country of the NOC, which is entering him.
 5. Disputes relating to the determination of the country which a competitor may represent in the OCA GAMES shall be resolved by the EB, unless the eligibility code already set out in the Constitution has been fulfilled and is not in dispute.
- ***Bye-law to Article 52***
 1. *All cases of infringement of IOC Rule 41, 42 and it's Bye-laws and of the eligibility code of IFs shall be communicated by the concerned Member to the OCA, to be considered by the EB whose decision will be final.*
 2. *A competitor who is a national of two (2) or more countries at the same time may represent either one (1) of them, as he may elect. However, after having represented one country in the Olympic, Asian continental regional or world championships recognised by the relevant IF, the competitor may not represent another country unless he or she meets the conditions set forth in sub section 4 below that apply to the persons who has changed his nationality or acquired a new nationality.*
 3. *A competitor who has represented one country in the Olympic Games, OCA GAMES, continental, regional, and world championships recognised by the relevant IF, and who has changed his nationality or acquired a new nationality, shall not participate in the OCA GAMES to represent his new country until three years after such change or acquisition.*
 4. *If a State, Country or a colony acquires independence, a country becomes incorporated within another country by a change of border or transfer of sovereignty or if a new NOC is recognised by the OCA, a competitor may continue*

to represent the country to which he belong or belonged. However, he may, if preferred, choose to represent his country or be entered in the OCA GAMES by his new NOC if one exists. This option can only be made once and is irreversible.

5. *In all cases not expressly addressed in these Bye-Laws, in particular those cases where a competitor would be in a position to represent a country other than that of which he is a national, or to have choice as to the country which he intends to represent, the EB makes all decisions. Decisions can be of a general or individual nature and issue specific requirements relating to nationality, citizenship, domicile or residence of the competitors, including the duration of any waiting period;*
6. *Except as permitted by the EB, no competitor, coach or official who participates in the OCA GAMES may allow his person, name and picture or sports performances to be used for advertising purposes during the OCA GAMES.*

Article 53

- Necessary Conditions for representing a Country
1. Only nationals of member NOCs are eligible to represent that country in the OCA GAMES. Where a competitor's nationality is the subject of scrutinization, evidence (passport, residency & other documents) must be produced to support and meet definition of eligibility, according to the rules prevailing in the particular sport in which the competitor wishes to take part. It is not permissible for a competitor having once represented a country in the OCA GAMES or any international sports competition such as Olympic Games, Asian Games, World Games, Continental Games, Regional Games etc., to represent a different country in the future unless:
 - a. The former country or place of birth has since been incorporated in another State;
 - b. Or if he/she competed for the former country because the NOC or Chief National Organisation of their native land was not a Member of the OCA at that time;
 - c. The rules in relation to Article 49 byelaw 4 are met.
 2. Competitors will be eligible if they comply with the following qualifications:
 - a. That they were born in the country they represent;

- b. That they are nationals or citizens of the country they represent and have lived there continuously for a period of not less than three years;
 - c. That they have become naturalised in the country they represent and have permanent residence there.
- 3. Competitors born outside Asia cannot be qualified unless they meet conditions in 2 b & c, where applicable.

- ***Bye-law to Article 53***

The OCA will have the full authority for disqualification of any athlete in all matters other than technical.

Article 54

- Age Limit
 - There is no age limit for competitors in the OCA GAMES, unless the IF and/or AFs prescribe otherwise and is approved by the EB apart from AYG which has an age restriction of 14-17 years.

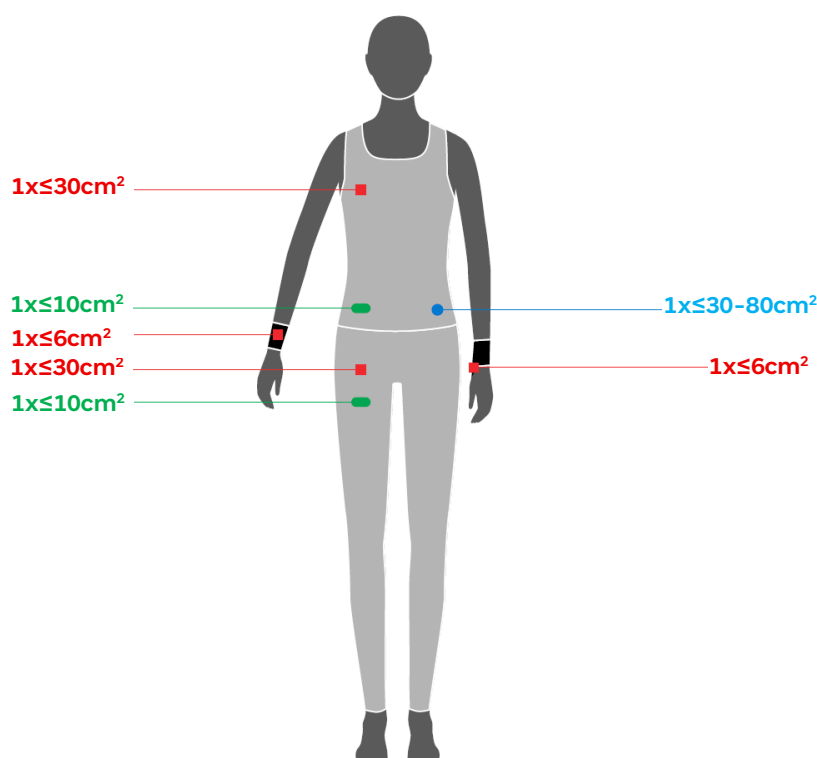
Please note that presented below are examples of identification markings (manufacturer logos, athlete names, and/or other similar markings) acceptable on uniforms and related items used in this competition, based on the OCA Commercial Guidelines and relevant IF/AF regulations.

Since these examples illustrate major points only, please ensure to review the full text of the guidelines and regulations for details.

During the Asian Games period, the OCA Commercial Guidelines take precedence over IF/AF regulations relating to commercial branding and identification marks on clothing and equipment, unless otherwise approved by the Executive Board of the OCA.

Identification marks violating these standards will be removed or covered in accordance with OCA's instructions to AINAGOC and NOCs.

【Identification of the Manufacturer】

○ Clothing

- Shorts/Pants | Shirt/Singlet | Tracksuit/Jacket | Leotard | Unitard

One Identification of the Manufacturer [■] per clothing item will be permitted, to a maximum size of 30cm².

○ Sport Equipment

For any sports equipment, the size of an Identification of the Manufacturer shall not exceed 10% of the surface area (up to a maximum of 60cm²).

• Wrist band | Wrist protection | Grips

One Identification of the Manufacturer [■] per item will be permitted, to a maximum size of 6cm².

• Socks

One Identification of the Manufacturer will be permitted, to a maximum size of 10cm²

○ Accessories

• Eyewear

May carry the Identification of the Manufacturer as generally used on products sold through retail trade during the period of 6 months or more prior to the Games, with the Identifications permitted on the lenses so long as such identifications are tone-on-tone, engraved into the lens, and is not deemed as conspicuous by the OCA.

• Towel

No Identification of the Manufacturer will be permitted.

• Bag

One Identification of the Manufacturer per item will be permitted, not greater than 10% of the surface area of the item, to a maximum size of 60cm².

○ Shoes/Footwear

• Shoes

All footwear items may carry the Identification of the Manufacturer as generally used on products sold through the retail trade during the period of 6 months or more prior to the Games.

【Product Technology Identification】

○ Clothing

• Shorts/Pants | Shirt/Singlet | Tracksuit/Jacket | Leotard | Unitard

One additional Product Technology Identification [■] will be permitted per clothing item, with a maximum size of 10cm².

【NOC Emblem and National Identity】

Third Party Identifications (athlete names)

No names of athletes allowed on items.

NOC Emblems and National Identity

All competitors who participate in competition must wear an identification of their country/ territory in the form of a flag (in official colours) or the country name (OCA abbreviation or in full) [●] and may not exceed the maximum overall area of 80cm² and must cover a minimum overall area of 30cm². A national emblem, NOC emblem, or crest, if the country/territory has one, or its coat of arms may be worn, but only in addition to the flag or country/territory name [●], and with the same maximum size requirement. The uniform may be designed in national colours and portray clearly the national identity, as long as a flag or country name (abbreviated or in full) is included. The identification can be in the form of a patch, crystals, screen print or other method, and must be sewn-on or affixed to prevent removal during competition. Such emblems may appear as follows:

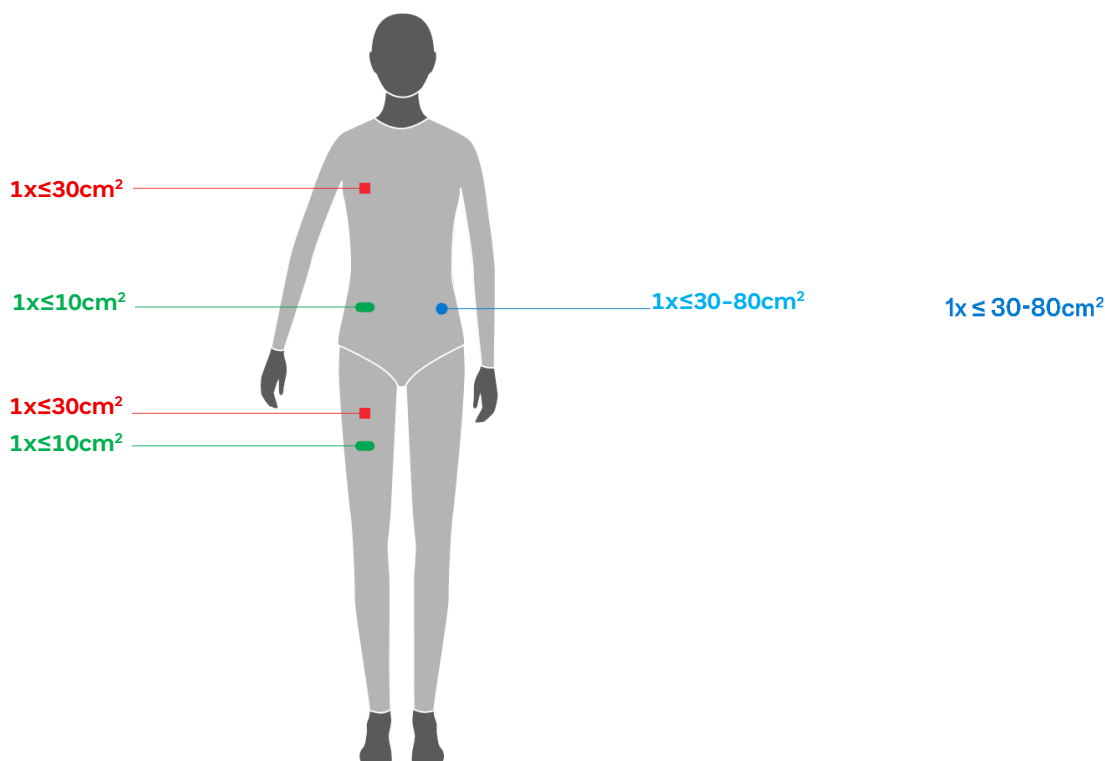
Men's singlet

Anywhere on the front or side, ensuring aesthetic presentation.

During the Qualification competition for the Olympic Games, the additional individual gymnasts from a NOC with a qualified team must wear a distinctively different colour singlet (MAG) and leotard (WAG) than the gymnasts participating in the team event.

The national identification on the warm-up suit is not regulated, but should be reasonable and in good taste in keeping with other rules as specified.

One Identification of the Manufacturer [■] per clothing item will be permitted, to a maximum size of 30cm².

○ Sport Equipment

For any sports equipment, the size of an Identification of the Manufacturer shall not exceed 10% of the surface area (up to a maximum of 60cm²).

- **Wrist band | Wrist protection | Grips**

One Identification of the Manufacturer [■] per item will be permitted, to a maximum size of 6cm².

- **Socks**

One Identification of the Manufacturer will be permitted, to a maximum size of 10cm².

○ Accessories

- **Eyewear**

May carry the Identification of the Manufacturer as generally used on products sold through retail trade during the period of 6 months or more prior to the Games, with the Identifications permitted on the lenses so long as such identifications are tone-on-tone, engraved into the lens, and is not deemed as conspicuous by the OCA.

NOC Emblems and National Identity

Women's leotard

Anywhere on the front or on either sleeve of the leotard, ensuring aesthetic presentation.

During the Qualification competition for the Olympic Games, the additional individual gymnasts from NOC with a qualified team must wear a distinctively different colour singlet (MAG) and leotard (WAG) than the gymnasts participating in the team event. The national identification on the warm-up suit is not regulated but should be reasonable and in good taste in keeping with other rules as specified.

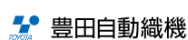
