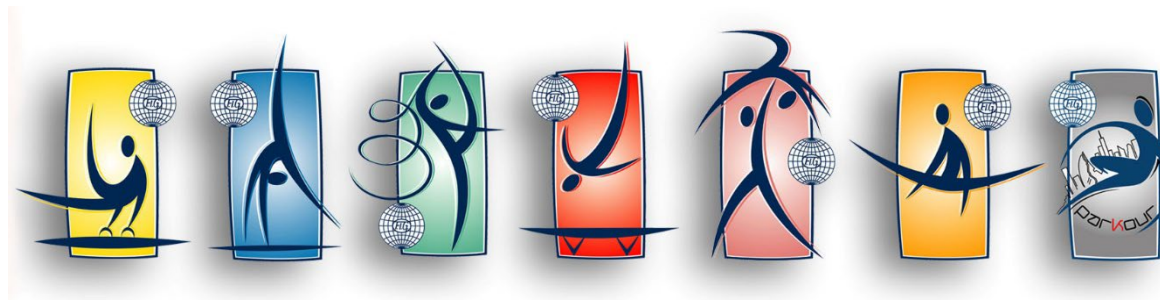

## 1. INTRODUCTION

Gymnastics is a judgement sport and judges are an integral part of the sport of gymnastics. As a result, the rules for officiating must be transparent, fair and must maintain sport justice for all athletes. Judges are trained within their own federation gaining valuable experience before entering the international scene. The FIG is responsible to provide educational materials and courses as well as a fair examination process to achieve the international level of brevet.

The General Judges' Rules apply to all FIG competitive disciplines. In addition, specific rules have been developed for each discipline to clarify the differences. Judges' Rules are approved by the FIG Executive Committee.

The FIG International Judges' brevet is issued in accordance with the General and Specific Judges' Rules. To be considered as an internationally breveted judge during an Olympic cycle, the judges have to attend an official FIG Judges' course and pass the examination at the beginning of or during each respective cycle.

The Judges' courses and examinations are carried out according to the protocols listed in this document. Additional specific operational directives shall be established to ensure consistency amongst the disciplines as well as a high level of educational delivery.

The assignment of sanctions and awards are the same for all disciplines. The quality of work of the judges is evaluated according to 5 criteria: Excellent, Very Good, Good, Fair, Poor.

## 2. JUDGES' EDUCATION

### 2.1 General Information

The judges' examinations will be offered with Retest possibilities. Examinations must be prepared and delivered with great responsibility and care following the protocols and directives as approved.

The format is identical at all courses.

~~The conditions of participation are detailed in the present Rules.~~

~~The same course schedule will be used at all courses as mentioned in each discipline's Specific Judges' Rules.~~

All courses shall have the same curriculum and examination delivery. Details of the preparation process are listed in the Directives.

~~It is the responsibility of the FIG TCs to prepare the curriculum ensuring good teaching principles, presentation using clear examples, as well as special focus on the stressing changes in rules from the previous CoP. Full routines, elements and parts, once pre-judged, must also be explained fully as examples.~~

~~Candidates must be given a good explanation of the process which will be followed and the conditions of the examination have to be fair, transparent, and identical at each course and in all disciplines~~

~~To deliver the curriculum the experts must demonstrate good teaching and presentation skills, experience in teaching methodology, good command of English, as well as adequate computer skills~~

## **2.2 Type of Courses**

All Judges' courses are published on the FIG website.

### **2.2.1 Intercontinental Courses hosted by FIG**

In each discipline one Intercontinental Course will be approved per cycle. [Courses will be held back-to-back in Lausanne \(SUI\) for all disciplines in November-December 2024.](#)

~~Eligibility to attend is listed in the General Judges' Rules, whereas~~ The number of participants per NF is [outlined](#) ~~specified~~ in the Specific Judges' Rules.

TC Presidents of Continental Unions are invited to participate in the Intercontinental Course and are considered out of the quota. If they cannot attend the Intercontinental Course, they are considered out of quota at International Courses as well.

The Intercontinental courses will be held in English , without translation (~~details will be included in the Directives~~). The TC Members in each discipline will deliver the course ~~curriculum~~.

Marking examinations and compiling results will be processed and digitally computed automatically..

The full and final results of the Intercontinental course (by judge number) will be reviewed by the TC and the final results for the 5 criteria (excellent, very good, good, pass, fail) will be determined. This will be a TC decision ~~and all TC members will have to be part of the decision~~. The TC Presidents will sign off ~~on~~ the document. This scale will then be published and applied for all other courses [and the online examination](#) for the whole cycle.

[Final](#) results will be verified [by the TC Presidents and](#) the FIG office. [The Brevet Card Results Certifications will be](#) sent to the federations ~~within 10 working days~~. ### **2.2.2 International Courses allocated by FIG**

~~International Courses will be organized on a geographic and language basis. Federations will then have an opportunity to bid for these multinational courses. Details of the process to be followed for each discipline are in the Event Bid Questionnaire and will be distributed by FIG for federation bids in every continent from January to September 2025.~~

~~The courses will be filled on a first come – first serve basis. Course sizes will be structured as follows:~~

~~All NFs, including the Host Country, may register a maximum of 15 eligible judges. After the deadline, in case of remaining places, the course will be filled in order of priority as follows:~~

~~— 3 additional judges from the host~~

~~3 additional judges from other federations according to the date of registration~~

~~The participation of a certain number of coaches as “auditors” will be allowed, based on the space available. In any case, the participation of max 2 coaches per federation will be allowed. The host federation will be allowed to participate with a maximum of 5 coaches. Coaches cannot intervene during the presentation sessions, but may submit questions in writing according to the policies of the course.~~

~~The International courses will be held in English. Continental Unions may provide translation at their own costs.~~

~~The TC will name the Experts who will deliver the courses. One expert/TC member maximum may be from the host country; however, this expert/TC member may not be the course leader.~~

- ~~– For the courses up to 30 candidates 1 expert is required~~
- ~~– For the courses up to 60 candidates 2 experts are required~~
- ~~– For the course with 61 and more candidates 3 experts are required~~

~~Marking examinations and compiling results will be processed and digitally computed automatically. These are still reflected only by judge number not name. The results have to be reviewed in accordance with the evaluation scale. Final results will be verified by the TC Presidents and the FIG office. The Brevet Card Results Certifications will be sent to the federations within 10 working days. No results are communicated at the end of any course.~~

### **2.2.3 Retest Courses hosted by FIG**

~~The courses will have a maximum of 35 participants and will be held at the FIG office. The course will be held in English. The candidate eligibility is determined in these General Judges’ Rules. In each discipline, one Retest course will be held in Lausanne (SUI) between October and December 2025 in English and without translation (See also article 2.7 below about other retest possibilities).~~

Marking examinations and compiling results will be processed and digitally computed automatically. These are still reflected only by judge number not name. The results have to be reviewed in accordance with the evaluation scale. [Final](#) results will be verified [by the TC Presidents and the FIG office](#). [The Brevet Card Results Certifications will be](#) sent to the federations ~~within 10 working days~~. No results are communicated at the end of any course.

### **2.3 Regional [Online Examination Courses upon Federation \[Continental Union\]\(#\) request](#)**

[Each Continental Union may request one \(1\) online examination \(without course\) to be organised between October and December 2025 under the supervision of the FIG. Additional requests due to time zones may be submitted to the FIG for approval.](#)

The course will have a maximum of [400](#) participants. Only Cat. 4 may be attained.

~~The participation of a certain number of coaches as “auditors” will be allowed, based on the space available. In any case, the participation of max 2 coaches per federation will be allowed. The host federation will be allowed to participate with a maximum of 10 coaches. Coaches cannot intervene during the presentation sessions, but may submit questions in writing according to the policies of the course.~~

~~Translation at the costs of the organizer is possible into any language in the Regional Courses~~

#### ***Marking of examinations and results process***

~~The final results from the courses are compiled into a computer by the Administrator on site or sent to the FIG office for scan correction and the percentages are applied automatically for a full review of the results of the course. Marking examinations and compiling the results will be processed and digitally computed automatically. These are still reflected only by judge number not name. [Final](#) results will be verified [by the TC Presidents and the FIG office](#). [The Brevet Card Results Certifications will be](#) sent to the federations ~~within 10 working days~~. ### **2.4 Conditions of Participation**

## 2.5 Judging Examinations

Details for each discipline are provided in the Specific Judges' Rules.

### 2.5.1. Educational Material

All Educational Material to prepare for the examinations will be provided online through the STS platform with access permitted for each candidate after registration by their respective federation. This material will include Power Points with the lecture presentations, practice routines with analysis, access to a large IRCOS video library from competitions ~~in this cycle~~, and more depending on the discipline. Login to the STS platform will be confirmed by each NF once candidate registration is complete.

### 2.5.2 Examination Process

The TC will have the responsibility to compile the Practical examinations. The review of all educational material provided and a strong theoretical knowledge are expected from all candidates. No Theory examination will be held.

For each discipline, multiple sets of examinations will be prepared according to the needs of the discipline. The examination for the Intercontinental Course will have different exercises than the other sets. Complete information will be found in the Examinations Directives and/or Specific Judges' Rules once published.

## 2.6 Examination Results and Experience Requirements

All brevet judges of the 2022-2024 cycle will retain their international licence and be able to judge competitions starting 01.01.2025 with the 2025-2028 CoP until their examination result is released [or at the very latest by 01.04.2025 \(whichever comes first\)](#). Failure or lack of participation in a scheduled judge's course and examination will automatically invalidate their 2022-2024 brevet.

A judge who has not met the judging experience requirements for the Category earned in the examinations will receive the category in accordance with the competitions successfully judged. The category earned can be validated upon request from the NF, if the missing experience is fulfilled within two (2) years of the new cycle (end of 2026). The competition groups from the 15<sup>th</sup> cycle and 16<sup>th</sup> cycle can be counted cumulatively for an upgrade.

Category 1 judges must have met the experience requirements before the start of the Intercontinental Course. There is no opportunity to upgrade to Category 1 after the Intercontinental Course.

Line and/or time judge assignments will fulfil an International Competition experience requirement only one (1) time per cycle in the highest Group received.

FIG approved International competitions at which an International judge functions as a member of the SJ will count towards judging experience requirements.

In case of passing or failure results, a judge can only drop 2 categories in one cycle: i.e. Category 1 can drop at worst to Category 3, Category 2 can drop at worst to Category 4.

Only one Fast Track or Upgrade permitted per cycle. A first time Brevet can achieve a maximum of Category 3 in his/her first cycle.

Based on examination results, the judging experience requirements at FIG approved International competitions during the XVI cycle (2025-2028), to attain or maintain the category for the XVII Cycle (2029-2032) – (Groups based on the 2025-2028 General Judges' Rules) will be determined in the first semester of 2025

## 2.7 Retest Opportunity

Only one Retest opportunity will be permitted per judge per cycle, either:

- at the International Courses allocated by FIG,
- at the Retest Course hosted by FIG, or
- at an Online Examination

### 2.7.1 Retest following dissatisfaction with examination results (not including failure)

The Judge must retake the full examination at another course with or without attending the lectures. ~~For the entire course and full examination: fees for course as per directives. For the examination only: the Local Organising Committee will determine at its discretion the costs of accommodation, meals, local transportation, coffee breaks etc.~~

Retest only once per cycle

The retest result will be valid and final.

### **2.7.2 Retest following failure at a course**

The Judge must take the entire course – [except for an Online Examination where no course is held](#) – and full examination again.

~~Retest only once per cycle~~

The retest result will be valid and final.

## **2.8 Judging Interruption**

A judge who did not renew his/her brevet may continue his/her career as a judge after the interruption as follows:

- After one (1) cycle, a judge may re-qualify for the previous category held before the interruption, once the judge attains the examination results for that specific category and the missing experience requirements are fulfilled (within two (2) years of the new cycle). If judges do not achieve the experience requirement to match their examination results within 2 years, they will receive the Category in accordance with competitions judged.
- After more than one (1) cycle, the judge must begin the judging process again under the conditions that apply to a highest National level judge

## **2.9 Information concerning FIG Authorities and TC Members**

The TC members shall automatically maintain for the following cycle the category they held in the cycle just completed.

TC members, who are not candidates or are not elected at the end of a cycle, shall automatically maintain the same category for the following cycle that they had as a TC member.

New TC Members for the 2025-2028 cycle must review the educational materials [and attend the intercontinental judges' course \(no examination required\)](#).

Other FIG authorities while serving and continuing as authorities will continue to maintain their category in the subsequent cycle.

Other FIG authorities (not as candidates, or re-elected [but not serving their mandate](#), or not re-elected in 2024) with a current FIG brevet ~~may have limited or no experience requirements in attaining or maintaining their Category from the 2022-2024 cycle. For the 2025-2028 cycle they will retain their Category (to a maximum of Category 2),~~ [provided that they](#) review the educational materials and attend a judges' course (no examination required)

### 3. JUDGES' REGISTRATION, DATABASE AND INFORMATION

Names, brevet categories and nationalities of all judges with a valid brevet are available on the FIG website. In consultation with the TCs/PK Commission, the FIG Office shall maintain a database with each judge's name, nationality, brevet level, licence ID number, and competition experience in the concerned respective discipline. NFs are responsible for providing the FIG Office with any update regarding the above-mentioned information related to their respective judges.

## 6. REQUIREMENTS FOR JUDGES PER PANEL AND SUPERIOR JURY FOR FIG SANCTIONED REGISTERED COMPETITIONS

Every Competition has a President of SJ/TD depending on the group and type of competition.

All positions including T & L require a valid FIG brevet **unless otherwise provided.** ~~(except where noted).~~ If there is an insufficient number of judges in the required categories at a competition, the TD or President of the SJ may take whatever action is needed to secure the running of the event.

### FIG TC members:

- may only serve as TDs and Supervisors at FIG sanctioned competitions, unless extraordinary approval is given by the respective TC President and Secretary General.
- must inform their TC President in writing and in advance of attending any competitions, courses, seminars, clinics or lectures for judges or coaches outside the NF they represent, unless invited directly by FIG.
- may serve on SJ or as AS at the OG regardless of their category

Other FIG authorities cannot serve as judges, SJ members, Supervisors, TDs, etc. at any FIG sanctioned competitions.

### Judges officiating at competitions must:

- have the nationality (citizenship) of the federation they represent and authority to participate from their federation in accordance with FIG Statutes
- maintain integrity of all decisions, showing no preference or bias
- possess competence to apply the Code of Points and other rules of the FIG
- demonstrate good moral and ethical behavior

- show respect to others by being punctual and respecting all rules
- respect the judges' oath, the FIG Code of Ethics, the FIG Code of Conduct, and the FIG Code of Discipline

Any close family relative to a competitive gymnast/athlete may not judge that gymnast/athlete or his/her unit (pair, group, etc.) at any FIG sanctioned event. The following are considered as close family relative: people who are or were married to, or live in a registered partnership or co-habit with a gymnast/athlete as well as people who are related to a gymnast/athlete by birth or marriage in direct or in collateral line, including the following persons: grandparent, parent, uncle, aunt, brother, sister, child, grandchild, nephew and cousin. If a conflict should or could appear, the following people are to be informed, so appropriate action can be taken:

- For competitions with a FIG TD / FIG SJ & OG/YOG/TWG qualifying competitions : Secretary General, TC President or President of SJ (if different)
- For all other competitions: TC President or President of SJ (if different).

The details of the procedure for the competition judges' draw, based on the principles mentioned in the Technical Regulations, are outlined in the Specific Judges' Rules.

Judges may only serve in one official position (e.g. D and E or E and L at same time is not permitted) per competition phase. Exceptions:

- CJP acts also as a judge in PK ;
- CJP and Time is permitted in ACRO and AER (only when necessary).

MAG T & L judges may judge WAG T & L and vice versa, but only receive experience credit in their respective discipline. The same is true for RGI and RGG.

- ~~For Trampoline (TRA), all apparatus (IND, SYN, TUM, DMT) are included in the Olympic Discipline~~

Neutral judges for all competitions must always have written authorization from their home Federation, sent in advance to the LOC (with copy to the President of the SJ or TC President).

## 7. JUDGES' ATTENDANCE AT COMPETITIONS AND PODIUM TRAINING

Judges arriving late for competitions (force majeure) may be allowed to judge at the discretion of the TD / SJ President, but a signed note from transportation company is required to demonstrate the judge or federation was not at fault. Judges will be included in a draw on a specific day, only if they are present at the judges' meeting for that phase of the competition.

Judges may not leave earlier than the official departure day of the event when they are appointed by FIG. Judges need to ask permission of the TD / SJ President in advance before leaving a competition before completion. In General, Execution and Artistry/Artistic Judges are not permitted to

view the Podium Training of athletes from the FOP. More details may be available in the Specific Judges' Rules of each respective discipline, COP or the competition Directives.

## **8. JUDGES' PANELS MINIMUM STANDARDS**

The minimum standards required for judges' panels in FIG sanctioned competitions are presented in the tables below.

Any competition may use the standards of a higher group. ~~These are the minimum standards:~~

~~All panel sizes are the minimums.~~ The panel maximum size may not exceed those of Group 1 for Olympic disciplines and Group 2 for Non-Olympic disciplines.

All exceptions to the minimum standards must be approved in advance of the arrival day of the delegations by the respective TC President (or Secretary General) for Group 4 competitions. Any other exceptions (Groups 1-3) will require approval from the Executive Committee.

## 10. JUDGES' RECOGNITIONS AND AWARDS

### 10.1 Preamble

Judges are an integral part of the sport of gymnastics. Once a judge is breveted by FIG, then records are maintained to recognize or sanction their performance.

The nominations for recognition and awards are based on two distinct principles, excellent performance and long-term dedicated service to gymnastics as an active international official. The TCs of each discipline and PK Commission establish the criteria to be used and have the responsibility to recognize judges. as follows:

### 10.2 Excellence in Judging

This award is based on an "excellent" evaluation during a major FIG competition where a post competition control is conducted. The recognition will not apply to any specific phases of the competition, but to the overall performance during the entire event.

This will apply to the OG, YOG, TWG, WCH, JWCH, and possibly World Cup, World Challenge Cup and other Multi-sport Games, if an evaluation programme is carried out. There is no limit to the number of commendations a judge may receive in a cycle as long as they fulfil the criteria.

### 10.3 Longevity of Judging Service

This award is based on a significant contribution to gymnastics as an international official over a period of many years. The awards listed are based on a judgment without sanctions (except verbal warnings), during the designated period.

The member Federations submits to the FIG Sports Department (sports@fig-gymnastics.org) the name(s) of their judges deserving the gold level award between 01 January and 28 February of each year. After verification by the respective Sports Manager and the TC President that the conditions are met, the decision is taken and communicated **to the respective NF** ~~with presentation once a year at the World Championships, The World Games, or significant competition for the respective discipline.~~

The same nomination procedure applies for the candidates for the Honorary Judges' Award. However, after verification of the conditions, the Secretary General submits the request to the Executive Committee for final decision. Presentation is made at the discretion of the respective NF.

## 11. JUDGES' DISCIPLINARY **MEASURES** ACTIONS AND APPEAL PROCESS

### 11.1 General

Judges are obliged to respect the judges' oath and to execute their function at all competitions with highest possible quality (honesty and integrity) and without bias.

The TC and PK Commission members are responsible for the education, control and supervision of the work of the judges. They investigate and take any **measure** ~~action~~ necessary during the competition, and following the event conduct an analysis of the competition videos **as required**.

**Poor** ~~Unsatisfactory~~ and/or biased judging will be subject to disciplinary proceedings and sanctions.

Judging is based on the Code of Points. Other considerations, such as nationality, friendship, etc. are deemed as biased judging. The official FIG JEP program will have to be used for the evaluation of the judges' work during and after the competition.

~~After the competition and after the judges' analysis, written warnings may be issued by the TC via the FIG Secretary General against judges, whose behaviour or work is assessed as poor. The TC can **may** also refer the case to the Disciplinary Commission of the Gymnastics Ethics Foundation (GEF) through the FIG Secretary General. Judges who have been reported significantly bias (high and very high bias) in JEP (verified with a post competition expert score by the TC) must be brought to the GEF Disciplinary Commission by the FIG Secretary General.~~

Sanctions because of poor and/or biased judging apply irrespectively of whether the judge acted consciously (with intent) or unconsciously (without intent).

The NFs are also responsible for the actions and behaviour of their judges.

## 11.2 Disciplinary **Measures** ~~Actions~~ and Sanctions against Judges

### 11.2.1 Disciplinary **Measures** ~~actions~~ during the competition

A judge can be warned once, at most a second time and then may be excluded from the competition. However, in case of a very serious mistake, the Technical President can exclude a judge immediately, without previous warning.

~~During the competition, art. 7.8.1 Section 1 of the FIG Technical Regulations applies. The **actions** **disciplinary measures** taken during a competition are without prejudice to any possible sanction pronounced after the analysis made of the judges' work ~~following the competition~~.~~

A judge may be removed and replaced immediately or not allowed to judge in a following competition phase for the following:

- Receiving a second warning
- Taking part in obvious discussions and/or agreements with other judges with the intent to collaborate
- Showing favoritism or disfavor toward an individual gymnast or a team, after a warning
- Continued unjustified high deviations below or above the deductions for errors as stated in the Code of Points or in the Specific judges' rules, after having been given a verbal warning
- Speaking with other judges and/or giving some signs during the competition following a verbal warning
- Having used means of communication which are not permitted during the competition (e.g. mobilephone)
- Cheating or proven corrupt behaviour
- Not attending the official activities and judges' instructions (according to the Code of Points, TR, competition directives, or judges' rules) during the official period of the competition
- Abusive behaviour
- Abuse or misuse of the official accreditation (violation of the Accreditation Rules)
- Obstructing the operation of the competition

~~The exclusion of a judge during a competition can be followed by further sanctions depending on the severity of the problem (refer to art. 9.2 b) below)~~

## 11.2.2 Sanctions after a competition

After the conclusion of each Final, the TC shall conduct the post-competition video review and analysis of the judges' work.

All cases, where a judge has received the result "Poor", ~~may~~ will result in a written warning by the TC/Commission through the Secretary General or may be referred to the GEF Disciplinary Commission ~~through the Secretary general~~.

Judges having been identified as significantly biased by JEP (high and very high bias), verified with a post competition expert score from the TC, must be brought to the GEF Disciplinary Commission ~~by the Secretary general~~ in due time.

The GEF Disciplinary Commission will take a decision ~~in compliance with according to Art. 23, of the Code of Discipline. Possible sanctions are mentioned in the present Rules and in Art. 34 of the FIG Statutes and under 12 of these Rules~~

The details of the sanction will be stated in the decision which is subject to appeal.

The sanctions taken against judges by the Continental Unions during their own competitions must be communicated to the FIG Secretary General who shall forward this information to the authorities concerned. ~~All proposals for sanctions (except verbal warnings) after the competition must be referred to the GEF Disciplinary Commission through the FIG Secretary General.~~

## 11.2.3 Sanctions against Judges and Federations

The federations are informed about the sanctions against their judges (except in case of verbal warnings).

For sanctions against judges as described in ~~12 of these Rules~~, according to the Statutes, ~~Art. 34~~, federations will be informed and, depending of the seriousness of the case, will not be permitted to send judges to the next OG, YOG, WCH, JWCH and/or TWG of the discipline concerned.

All written sanctions against judges and NFs will be communicated and signed by the President of the respective GEF Disciplinary Commission.

## 11.3 ~~Levels of Appeals~~ Proceedings

Jury of Appeal: ~~disciplinary measures or sanctions taken against judges during competition (e.g. verbal warnings or removal of a judge from the competition) can be appealed~~ Judges who are sanctioned during competition have the right to appeal to the Jury of Appeal. ~~Appeals for verbal warnings are submitted to the Jury of Appeal.~~ Such appeals must be treated immediately. The decision of the Jury of Appeal is final and valid for the relevant competition.

GEF Disciplinary Commission: ~~The judges who have received a written warning by the TC after the competition may appeal to the GEF Disciplinary Commission. The appeal must be made in writing within 21 days.~~

GEF Appeal Tribunal: Sanctions decided by the GEF Disciplinary Commission may be appealed to the GEF Appeal Tribunal.

Court of Arbitration for Sport (CAS): Decisions taken by the GEF Appeal Tribunal may be appealed to CAS ~~the Court of Arbitration for Sport~~ in Lausanne (SUI).

These General Judges Rules' have been approved by the Executive Committee at its meeting **XXX**. They enter into effect 01.01.2025 and are valid for all judges' courses for the cycle 2025 – 2028.
